On Saturday, May 19th, Hiltonia and Palmer Lane (the neighborhood in Ewing just on the other side of the hospital) neighbors were welcomed on a guided tour and presentation of the hospital grounds. The weather was unexpectedly beautiful (the forecast was for rain), and we got to see nearly every inch of the campus. The older buildings, while mainly in disuse, are still beautiful. The newer buildings, where most of the bigger security issues were encountered, had updated fencing around courtyards as well as secure screens on the windows. The old doctors' cottages, which were probably welcome neighbors of Hiltonia, are used to house patients who are deemed most ready to leave the hospital.

Trenton Psychiatric Hospital's new CEO, Theresa McQuade,

led the presentation. We reviewed the past problems with security and were shown what had recently been done to correct them. The aforementioned climb proof fencing, along with added guard posts and improved security features has led to a drastic decline in walkaway patients, from 100+ per year to only 1 or 2 a month recently. The hospital is working on a "Health and Wellness" program that includes a planned move to make the hospital smoke-free.

The tour was the third meeting in less than 3 years that the Hiltonia Association and Palmer Lane Association have been involved in with the Hospital. While progress is slowly becoming evident, there are issues that the neighborhood will have to keep an eye on, especially in support of neighbors bordering the hospital that could use the larger voice of the association. The use of the doctors' cottages for patients has brought noise issues that have been addressed in recent years, but have popped up from time to time. Hiltonia may wish to take a zero tolerance approach if the problem continues since the change in use for those houses is fairly recent (15 - 20 years?)in terms of the overall age of our neighborhood and the hospital. Recently, temporary trailers were placed behind and close to a couple of houses on the first block of Cornwall Ave. While the officials admitted that the placement was due to a lack of thought, the trailers will likely be there until at least September, when they will be moved to the opposite side of the campus at an appropriate

location. Finally and most importantly, while the issue of patients walking away has finally been addressed in a meaningful manner, we should be vigilant and ready to come together if the problem reappears.

The civic committee, led by Don Wallar, is the part of the Hiltonia Association that usually leads the effort in working with State, County, and Trenton officials as it concerns our neighborhood. Contacts are made by keeping in touch through e-mails, phone calls, and attending meetings. America's Night Out Against Crime!

This year's National Night Out is scheduled for Tuesday August 7th.

Last year's National Night Out campaign involved citizens, law enforcement agencies, civic groups, businesses, neighborhood organizations and local officials from over 10,000 communities from all 50 states, U.S. territories, Canadian cities and military bases worldwide. In all, over 34 million people participated in NNO 2006.

NNO is designed to:

- Heighten crime and drug prevention awareness
- Generate support for, and participation in, local anticrime programs
- Strengthen neighborhood spirit and policecommunity partnerships
- Send a message to criminals letting them know that neighborhoods are organized and fighting back.

Protect Your Lines With Linesaver

American Water Resources, Inc, the nation's oldest and largest water company is now offering a comprehensive service program that covers the cost of repairing a water or sewer line breach. Cadwalader Park. Improvements Near

On May 21, 2007, the City of Trenton issued a request for proposals (RFP) for landscape architects to design and implement more than \$2 million in improvements to Cadwalader Park. This could mean that 2008 will be the year that shovels go in the ground to begin the estimated \$20 million in improvements identified in the park's recentlycompleted Master Plan. While the current project represents just a tiny fraction of the overall restoration plan, it easily represents the most significant series of improvements to Cadwalader Park in recent memory.

To arrive at the list of proposed improvements, the City culled elements from the Master plan for this phase that "will better connect the active recreation area to the more passive upper park as well as elements that will link Cadwalader Park to the D&R Canal Park." To that end, the City intends to complete the following in this phase:

- Replacing and relocating the canal bridge to realign the bridge with Lover's Lane and to include ADA compliance;
- Creating a canoe launch;
- Relocating the picnic grove closer to the Canal and playground;
- Designing a picnic pavilion in the scale and vernacular of the Olmsted design period; and
- Installing a playground appropriate for a park as important as Cadwalader to be located at the new picnic area.

Proposals from landscape architects are due on July 18 and a pre-bid conference is scheduled for June 13. The City's selection

criteria used in evaluating the proposals are "Experience, Proposal and Cost" - in that order. Despite not being ranked by number, the order suggests that a firm's experience and quality of their proposal will weigh more heavily than the cost of their services. Or, more importantly, that cost will not be the driving factor in the decision making. While not a guarantee, this approach should minimize the possibility of an inexperienced consultant winning with a low-ball bid.

Don't Go Reserving the New Picnic Shelter Just Yet

Assuming that the City receives one or more proposals from qualified firms, the chosen landscape architect should be authorized by the City to begin work sometime in late summer or early fall. While the City's RFP did not propose a schedule for the various deliverables required of the designer, it is conceivable that construction documents could be ready for bidding in 2008. Hopefully, the various permits and approvals - which represent every conceivable branch of government -- will not significantly delay construction. We expect to learn a lot more in the coming weeks about the status of permits and approvals as well as when construction might begin. Hopefully, the Association will be fortunate enough to have the design team attend an

upcoming general meeting as part of their requirement to meet with community stakeholders.

Preserving Preservation: Funding Outlook for Next Phase is Murky

With over \$17 million worth of needed improvements left to be funded, it is difficult to not begin thinking about the next phase of the Park's renovations. The \$2.6 million dedicated to this project comes, in large part, from the New Jersey Green Acres Program. You may recall hearing the Program's name tossed around in the news lately as the Governor and Legislators wrangle over the State budget. On one hand, Governor Corzine intends to fund the open-space preservation and recreation development with proceeds from the "monetization" of state assets. Meanwhile, State Legislators would like the Governor to authorize a ballot question for November that allows New Jersey voters to decide on whether or not to issue approximately \$175 million in bonds to fund future rounds of the program. 

Artworks Trenton Hosts Art All Night

Consider this, when was the last time someone uttered these words? "Boy, am I beat. I was out all night at an event in Trenton." If all goes according to plan, more than 1,000 people from around the region will be saying those words come June 24 after they have attended Trenton's 1st Annual Art All Night event. At 3:00 pm on June 23, Artworks Trenton will open it's facility for 24 continuous hours to perhaps the most ambitious art and music festival in recent memory. What makes the show so unique is that it's open to artists of all type and skill level. Anyone is welcome to submit one ready-to-hang original piece. From the construction paper and crayon art of pre-schoolers to the fine sculptures of accomplished regional artists -- everything will be displayed. As a backdrop to all this visual stimulation, local bands will be playing on two different stages throughout the day and night. Once it gets dark, art-themed movies will be shown on a large outdoor screen.

While the show depends on the participation of local artists to be a success, the organizers are currently in need of volunteers to help staff the event. Already, several of your Hiltonia neighbors have graciously volunteered to help out, but many more are needed.
